FY12 Proposed Budget

Realistic budgeting is the term we have committed to and Village department heads have stepped up to accomplish this goal. The Trustees are proposing a \$3,168,456 budget for the 2011-12 fiscal year. That figure represents a 3.85% over the 2010-11 budget. It would increase the tax burden by \$28 more per year on the typical village property valued at \$266,000. The increase for taxes is \$28 per year and \$15 of that can be attributed to reduction of the IBM subsidy.

In light of increased library use by Young Adult patrons over the past few years, and the trend of unsupervised youth in Essex Junction, Brownell Library is trying to respond to the needs of pre-teens and teens in our community. We have seen more youth visiting the library on their own after school, evenings, and weekends, sometimes leading to behavior issues. At present, a year-long grant from Vt. Dept. of Libraries (until August) allows us 6 extra hours per month for the YA Librarian to add programs for younger teens and kids, like Lego Building, Star Wars Club, and Wii Games. In cooperation with local organizations serving youth, we have identified demographics in need of opportunities for cultural enrichment and community engagement. Thanks to the grant, Fleming and ADL students, who come to the library while parents are working, are eagerly responding to a greater variety of programs geared to their interests. Library Trustees see a real need to expand the Young Adult Librarian position, from its current 26 hours per week into a 40 hour full-time position to support a fuller spectrum of services and programs geared toward the Young Adult population. Library Trustees worked hard to adjust the budget to accommodate the additional cost of a full-time YA Librarian, so that the total library budget is held to a 5.4% increase.

Unrestricted Fund Balance and Rolling Stock Fund

The Trustees are also asking voters in Article 3 on the Warning to increase the amount of unrestricted fund balance from 5% to up to 15% to meet the recommendations of the auditor and the National Government Finance Officers' Association (GFOA) to maintain unrestricted fund balance in the general fund of no less than two months of regular general fund operating expenditures. The 15% requested is actually a little less than 2 months of operating expenses; however, it is a more appropriate level for the financial viability of the Village. In addition in Article 4, the Trustees are recommending that the balance of the Rolling Stock Reserve Fund, which funds the purchase of equipment, be increased from \$500,000 to \$750,000 to reflect the increased costs of equipment since the fund's inception in 1990.

The Village of Essex Junction is fiscally solid and financially sound, though there are still some challenges to be overcome. The Village's total financial and material assets exceed its liabilities even though revenues from IBM, which funded 62% of the Village taxes 20 years ago, have been reduced to 18% in FY11. The IBM subsidy will continue to decline in the next three years until projected revenues from IBM will be approximately 10% from property taxes alone.

The Village government continues to seek out economic and community development initiatives. Tax burdens have been further reduced through the obtainment of a grant totaling \$55,497 from the Chittenden County Metropolitan Planning Organization to study the feasibility of constructing a connector road from Park St. (Route 2A) to Maple St. (Route 117) ending on Main Street (Route 15). This potential road is now called the "Crescent Connector". The Village match equals \$11,100. Without this grant, more of the project's costs may have been placed directly on the Village. We have also been approved for a \$21,400 Vermont Emergency Management grant for the replacement of the emergency generator which serves as a backup for the Five Corners traffic lights.

The Village continues to seek other grant monies for a multitude of projects: a multi-use safety path from Central St. to North St. along the railroad tracks, fire hose connections to fire hydrants, the installation of traffic signal pre-emption for the fire department, replacement of the bridge on Main Street, as well as an EPA climate change grant and a community arts grant.

Many Good Things are Happening...

The Village of Essex Junction is engaged in numerous activities that are working to improve our community. There is a new website design and we think the community will be very pleased. As well, the Village has applied for an "Our Town" Community Arts grant to hopefully involve local artists in answering the question: "What does Essex Junction, past, present, and future, mean to you?" In addition to these grant opportunities, the various volunteer-led initiatives such as the Five Corners Farmers Market and Railroad Avenue Recess group have been extraordinarily successful in planning activities like the Train Hop, Prize at the Fives and planting flowers in the downtown, with even more to come this year. It is important to note that the Memorial Day Parade was saved by the efforts of the Recreation Department and many volunteers. Every volunteer is a tremendous asset to Essex Junction and we are extremely grateful to all of them.
